But suddenly everyone wants a piece of it and they're not letting go: Irina, desperate to bury the ghosts she harbours. Dan, the frustrated researcher, spying a career boost. The film director seeing a box office success. "I forget and forget and forget, the exact words, the thread, so delicate."

Love, No Country, a debut play by Vanessa Ackerman, was nurtured through Menagerie's Development Programme and this is the premiere production. It is a powerful exploration of our relationship with history: when there are no longer any eyewitnesses, who has the right to tell stories of the past?

Blanche's imagination takes her to the cossetted, corseted world of Georgian England. Gossip, romantic disappointments, and the triumphs of dispossessed young gentlewomen resonate deeply with the disaffected Blanche. Her own isolation finds comfort in stories of a time when young women, rich or poor, had little agency of their own.
